## Flowerdale Landcare Group Update December 2022

It has been a difficult and complex year for the Flowerdale Landcare Group due to a number of factors. Firstly, coming out of the Covid restrictions there was a great deal to catch up on, but we led and participated in an Australia Day ceremony at the Flowerdale Hall in January; undertook tree plantings; night camera surveys for native animals and feral animals; participated in a major Platypus survey along the King Parrot Creek; took part in Clean up Australia Day and in some fund raising activities.

Several members have been involved in the Ribbons of Roadside Remnant Vegetation project up on Yea Spur Road and are looking forward to continuing to monitor this over coming years with night walks, trail camera surveys and wildflower walks.

Flowerdale Landcare engaged with Clean Up Australia Day again on March 6th, concluding the event with a coffee at Hazeldene Store. One and a half trailer loads were collected – most of it again from Coonans Reserve which seems to be the local favored dumping ground (please don't do that).

During the Platypus watch on Saturday 2nd April eight Platypus were seen by our 12 volunteers and one Rakali (Australian Water Rat), the best ever count in the last 8 years and shows that the King Parrot Creek has fully recovered from the damage during the millennium drought and 2009 Black Saturday bushfires. The Platypus Conservancy also carried out a survey in the same week with 5 nets placed across the creek identifying 16 Platypus over the 12 hours of the survey.

Our next survey intended for this month has been postponed until early next year due to the flooding in the creek as it is not possible to see the Platypus in rough water conditions and we need to wait until – hopefully the water levels have receded. Keep an eye open for when we do this as we will need assistance from volunteers again – and you don't need to be a member of the group to do that.

A Fox control program carried out at the beginning of the year resulted in about 50% of the more than 250 baits laid taken and a second program was completed during August/September, hopefully substantially reducing fox numbers. From the early reports by the UGLN Fox Control Committee, more than 50% of 235 baits were again taken, which means that there are still plenty of foxes around. The UGLN is planning a Fox Control Workshop and another ACUP chemical course to be held in Yea. These will be advertised closer to the time. This is broader than just about foxes, but of interest to all farm users of chemicals including weedicides and growth supplements.





From the night camera monitoring we are also recording a number of threatened species in greater numbers up and down the King Parrot Creek Catchment. This includes Phascogales, Long Nosed Bandicoots, and a number of bird species including Lyre birds and Bassian Thrushes. We also recorded a number of feral cats, including with birds and possums in their mouths, and cat owners should be reminded to keep their cats restrained on their properties to reduce this problem.

Flowerdale Landcare also celebrated 10 years in November at our AGM which included a talk by Kate Turner of the Murrindindi Wildlife Shelter, to talk about the work she does and to which she brought several very young possums that had been rescued a few days earlier.

Now is also the time for blackberry control and residents are reminded that the Landcare group have a spray trailer available to help control them on their properties although you will need to pay for the chemicals used.

As we have lost a number of our long-time members during the year due to moving away from the area, we are also looking for more members to assist with our activities. ## PROS AND CONS TO THE CHANGING MARKET

Even though house prices in Victoria have fallen (slightly) for the third consecutive month, potential first home buyers are still holding back on entering the market. Being a first home buyer is daunting at the best of times but with so much uncertainty in the market this experience is made even more difficult to navigate. The turbulent market has resulted in Victorian first home buyers reaching a record three-year low. Some are waiting for the market to drop even further, others simply cannot afford higher mortgage repayments due to the rising interest rates. It is important to note that it is highly unlikely we would experience a huge crash so there is no point waiting for this doubtful prediction to never come.

suggesting buyer demand has moderated. This is good news for first home buyers as there is reduced competition and greater choice. The 'fear of missing out' driven property market surge experienced last year is behind us leaving more time for these young inexperienced buyers to conduct their due diligence before making any big decisions. Over the last few months, we have seen mainstream buyers retreat to wait to see what happens, presenting opportunities for experienced buyers who are cashed up, educated, and prepared. It is understandable for our young Aussie home buyers to wait until rates normalise and house prices steady as buying a home is no easy decision.

According to PropTrack data, days on market has risen and sales levels have fallen

Previous downturns in the market have often seen governments introducing incentives to help first home buyers get into the market and raise demand. If the economy continues to slow next year, we are hoping to see a similar reaction from the government with new incentives introduced, especially if they raise the first home buyer stamp duty exemption threshold.

This is our first spring in 3 years without Covid concerns, yet the combined pressures of interest rates and inclement weather has seen the strong selling season well below normal levels. The unseasonably slower period for new listings and enquiry rate is proof that the pandemic price lift is over, and the actions of the reserve bank are affecting owners and buyers' confidence in the property market. New listing volume is down 9.2% year-on-year nationally. Yet the new listings coming onto the market are not being matched with strong buyer interest which is expected to accelerate further price declines and slow sales volume. So far though we haven't seen any evidence of forced or panicked sales which is humbling to hear that our community remains resilient.

Although market conditions are challenging for sellers, the homes that meet buyer's fussy expectations are still achieving quick sales. This is putting more emphasis on presentation and downward pressure on Vendors to present their homes with even more precision and attention to detail. Experts warn that there will be a slow recovery due to the added burden of high mortgaged homes, especially those that were exposed to competitive markets through Covid.

Looking ahead, we have many motivated Vendors looking to sell in the near future.

- Be Positive it's likely that something over the festive season will go wrong. In fact it is almost inevitable. Try not to panic, keep it in perspective, stay positive and try not to let it disrupt your plans.
- 6. <u>Self care</u> find time to do the things you enjoy and that allow you to reset and focus on yourself for a little while. This may be going for a walk, reading or enjoying a bath.
- 7. Eat well It's tough to eat well during the festive season, there are so many things to tempt us away from a healthy diet. Whilst it is ok to enjoy the food and treats on offer, remember to maintain a balanced diet.
